The Student Senate is a student-led leadership body designed to **amplify student voice**—particularly from historically marginalized groups—across Albemarle County Public Schools. It unifies existing student voice initiatives into one cohesive structure, allowing students to advise on school policy, promote equity, and develop leadership skills. Through monthly affinity group meetings, leadership summits, and direct engagement with division leadership, the Senate empowers students to shape decisions that impact their schools and communities.




GOAL 2: AFFIRMING AND EMPOWERING COMMUNITIES






Student Senate Organizing Change Self-Efficacy Survey








All Schools Increase in Parent Portal Accounts




422 more caregivers signed up for a Parent Portal account in SY 2425.

Elementary Schools Increase in Paper Opt-in after Student Senate Campaign




Secondary Schools Increase in Paper Opt-in after Student Senate Campaign
