Thursday, February 6, 2025: Deadline for completing action on Budget Bills

Saturday, February 22, 2025: Session adjourns sine die

Monday, March 24, 2025: Last day for Governor's action on legislation

Wednesday, April 2 or April 9, 2025: Reconvened session (to consider Governor's vetoes or amendments)

Tuesday, July 1, 2025: Effective date of enacted legislation

Funding Formula for High-Quality Public Education

ACPS calls for revising the funding formula to reflect actual costs, with more support for divisions with high needs, such as English learners and special education students.

Local Composite Index (LCI)

ACPS supports replacing the LCI with a more equitable per-pupil funding model, accounting for cost-of-living and special needs.

Cell Phone Use in Schools

ACPS advocates for legislation enabling schools to implement clear, enforceable guidelines for cell phone use to minimize distractions and balance tech in classrooms.

Recruitment of Bus Drivers

ACPS supports shortening the break-in-service requirement for bus drivers, making it easier for retired Virginia Retirement System (VRS) members to return to work during times of critical shortage.

Mental Health Supports

ACPS supports using supervised grad students as counselors and increasing funding for full-time school counselors to address the growing mental health crisis.

Workforce Development and Alternative Pathways to Teaching

ACPS supports expanding alternative teaching pathways, such as apprenticeships and residencies, to address the teacher shortage.

Free School Meals

ACPS advocates for free school meals for all students to eliminate meal debt and ensure students have access to nutritious food.

Collaborative Procurement

ACPS supports expanding collaborative procurement opportunities, allowing multiple agencies to pool their purchasing power, reduce costs, and streamline procurement timelines. Joint contracts and a centralized procurement platform would lead to significant cost savings and efficiency gains.

Solar Opportunities for Schools

ACPS supports legislation to reduce costs and regulatory delays for schools adopting solar energy projects.
